News and Views

This coming week will usher in the 9 days, which will culminate on Monday evening with the 9th of Av, when the first and second temples were destroyed. We know it as a time of mourning, a time of sadness for the Jewish people.

There are some indications that all is not sadness and mourning. We do not say Tachanun — supplication for forgiveness from God on the 9th of Av. The Rabbis explain that the reason for this is that Jeremiah, the author of lamentations describes this day as MOED - a Yom Tov, and just as on yom tov we do not say Tachanun, so too on the 9th of Av, Tachanun is not recited. There seems to be some ambiguity towards the status of this period.

Jeremiah the prophet, besides writing the book of Lamentations also has a set of prophecies which he records in the book of Yirmiyahu. His first prophecy is fascinating. God shows him a vision, and he asks Jeremiah to describe what he has seen. Jeremiah replies: I see an almond branch" and God says - you have seen well, because just like an almond is the quickest to ripen to fruit, so too, I will be quick to punish the Jewish people. Rashi, quoting the Midrash in Kohelet explains that it takes just 21 days for the blossoms of the almond tree to transform into a fully formed almond, and these 21 days represent the 21 days which form the 3 weeks from the 17th of Tammuz in which the walls of Jerusalem were besieged and broken until the 9th of Av when the temple was ultimately destroyed. If the prophecy is one of doom and destruction of the temple, why is it that the vision that Yirmiyahu is given is about growth, and blooming of a flower? This signifies new growth and development for the Jewish people, and not destruction! The imagery and the message don't fit into each other at all!

The prophecy of Yirmiyah is telling us that the moment of destruction is also a moment of growth, a moment of punishment is also a moment of closeness.

Yirmiyahu is given the prophecy of flowering, because if the Jewish people learn from the punishment that they have been given, they will again begin to flourish and bloom.

They will grow from the punishment that they have been given. Yirmiyah is being shown through the almond branch that God's intent in punishing the Jewish people is ONLY in order to provide them with an opportunity for self growth, and for closeness with him. It is unfortunate that this happens in punishment this time around, but its ultimate purpose is only for positive reasons.

This is why the 9th of Av is a MOED - it is a YOM TOV - a good day because if we put the lessons that Hashem has shown us to good use, we can connect in a wholly new and different way, which can only be achieved in other times of the year through the festivals themselves.
